What is the Word of God?

Word of God: The revelation of God to mankind.

¹ In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways,

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
Amittai ('aman):

Jonah's message is a prophecy, not a parable.

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- 1. It is presented as a prophecy, not a parable.
- 2. Jesus affirmed Jonah as a sign.

 A type of His Crucifixion and Resurrection.

God entrusts Jonah with a mission and a message.

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The Mission:

- 1. "Go to the great city of Nineveh"
- 2. "and preach against it,"

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The Mission:

- 1. "Go to the great city of Nineveh"
- 2. "and preach against it,"

The Message:

A declaration of judgment against Nineveh for their great wickedness.

God is perfectly holy and perfectly loving, full of both justice and mercy.

In Him there is no contradiction—
His deeds perfectly match His character.

Instead of choosing to lean *into* God's sovereign will, Jonah made the decision to run *away* from the God who had spoken to Him.



Why did Jonah run from God?

Jonah wanted to be the one to decide who God would show mercy to.

Why did Jonah run from God?

- 1. Fear for his life

- 4. Greater love for Israel than for God

Jonah wanted to protect Israel's chosen status, even if that meant defying God's commission.

⁴Then the LORD sent a great wind on the sea, and such a violent storm arose that the ship threatened to break up. ⁵ All the sailors were afraid and each cried out to his own god. And they threw the cargo into the sea to lighten the ship.

Who Jonah knows himself to be—even while actively fleeing from God—has everything to do and is completely wrapped up with who God is.

12 "Pick me up and throw me into the sea," he replied, "and it will become calm. I know that it is my fault that this great storm has come upon you."

⁴¹ The men of Nineveh will stand up at the judgment with this generation and condemn it; for they repented at the preaching of Jonah, and now something greater than Jonah is here.
