

Dirty Socks by Kristi Wile

Recently, we heard testimonies from several young adults who had been away serving God in various places this summer. One story touched my heart very deeply. Dylan Derstine shared of his experience at Victory Bible Camp as a counselor. In trying to reach the guys under his care and impress on them the importance of living a life truly changed by knowing Jesus, the idea of "dirty socks" came to light.

After a day of work or exercise, we remove our dirty socks. When we wash our feet, we don't put those dirty, smelly, sweat-soaked socks back onto our clean feet. Instead we put on a pair of clean socks. Dylan likened this analogy to our lives and how after Christ Jesus has saved us and cleansed us, we need to exhibit that change in clean living. Otherwise, how will we know we are truly saved?

I've been dwelling on my own sanctification recently and these words really pierced through. 1 Peter 1:14-16 says As obedient children, do not be conformed to the passions of your former ignorance (don't put your dirty socks back on), but as He who called you is holy, you also be holy in all your conduct (put on clean socks), since it is written, "You shall be holy, for I am holy." In verses 18-19 we read Knowing that you were ransomed... with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without blemish or spot. This tells us that we've been washed, and not just our feet, but our hearts too.

Later Peter quotes from Psalm 34 saying For "Whoever desires to love life and see good days, let him keep his tongue from evil and his lips from speaking deceit; let him turn away from evil and do good; let him seek peace and pursue it. For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous, and his ears are open to their prayer. But the face of the Lord is against those who do evil." (1 Pet. 3:10-12) When we choose to keep putting on dirty socks, the face of the Lord is against us. How then can we truly say we've been changed by the blood of Jesus?

Friends, living the life of faith in Jesus doesn't mean we are perfect or that we will always get it right. It does mean that we put away things that marked us before we came to know Christ's forgiveness. We wouldn't think twice about putting dirty socks on clean feet, but do we give much thought to our daily living in word or deed? God stands ready to forgive when we confess our sin. But confess we must.

Hebrews 12:14 says *Strive...for the holiness without which no one will see the Lord.* It's a sobering thought that we would strive for the wrong things and end up not seeing the Lord. Clean socks. Clean hearts. Clean hands and feet.
