

Light in the Darkness by Carol Landis

Tuesday, December 21, 2021, the earth will tilt on its axis, placing our northern hemisphere, at the farthest point away from the sun. Winter solstice. Each year, the day with the least amount of sun intersects with the season we celebrate Jesus, "the true light that gives light to all people" (John 1:9), coming to earth. We celebrate the birth of Jesus with lights, and recount the glory of the Lord shining on the dark hillside where shepherds watched sheep, and the notable star in the eastern night sky that led the Magi to Jesus. The intersecting of winter solstice and Christmas seems Divine.

Recently I realized the solar light hanging on a hook along our driveway offers me a visual of **darkness accentuating light**. Headlights, exterior garage lights, even interior house lights lessen the lantern's effect. Its light is most striking in complete darkness. I also noticed the twinkling lights lining the driveway of our neighbor's home are more breath-taking because of the surrounding darkness. Darkness emphasizes light's beauty.

Light illuminates and dispels darkness. Psalm 119:105 speaks of God's Word as a lamp, emitting light for the next step. The area close to the light is not dark. Light brings clarity, hope, and often a new perspective. In John 8:12, Jesus not only refers to Himself as "the light of the world," but also promises: "Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." Light. Do we see His Light in our dark places? Do we seek His Light? Is there a problem with the connection to Jesus, our Source, like that bulb with a poor connection in a string of Christmas lights? It's a blessing to acknowledge our disconnect, and ask Jesus to reconnect us and scatter the darkness.

"The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned" (Isaiah 9:2).

Beyond ambiance, Christmas lights remind us that Jesus came as Immanuel: God with us. Bringing light, and love, to dark places. Basking in His Presence, we can then be conduits of His Light to those around us. "But you are a chosen people...a people belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light (1 Peter 2:9)."

Lord, in our dark places, still us to seek and absorb Your light. Then Lord, lead us to those who need to experience Your Light.

Go tell – Our Savior, the Light of the World, is here!
