





Tyler Alderfer: I grew up in a Christian home where we attended church every Sunday (except on vacation), prayed before meals and before bed, and when I was little had Bible stories read to me. All of my grandparents, aunts and uncles all went to church and also had Faith filled homes. Church on Sunday is all I have ever known. I go to a Christian school where Faith is integrated into most courses and we have chapel 2 to 3 times a week. Until high school everyone I went to school with believed in God and even now in high school most kids do. All of these things were a good foundation for my beliefs in God and helped me grow as a kid.

As a kid growing up, seeing how my parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles and all of the adults I looked up to who believe in God, made me at a young age want that too. Around middle school I began to take following God more seriously and began integrating his words into my life. It really set in for me when in high school I saw kids that I used to hang out with turned to drugs and alcohol along with other things. This made me thankful that I had a strong faith to lean on and a lot of fellow believers that I can go to about this kind of stuff. Seeing those kids do that kind of stuff just brought me closer to God and strengthen my relationship with him.



Alycia Derstine: I was born in Florida with my parents, George and Pam, and two sisters, Brittany and Carissa. From an early age, we were raised in a Christian household where faith was a central part of our lives. We attended church every Sunday, and I was dedicated as a child. After moving to Pennsylvania, we continued to stay connected to our faith through church and Sunday school. My understanding of God began through the foundation my parents built for me.

As I grew older, especially during my teenage years, I still attended church regularly. When I went off to college I found myself surrounded by people who didn't share my beliefs, I slowly drifted away. I stopped going to church and focused more on my own life experiences than on Christ. Looking back, those four years were filled with fun and growth, but I often felt lost, unsure, and distant from God. I didn't fully grasp the meaning of the gospel or who Jesus truly is—mainly because I never took the time to seek Him out for myself. After college, I moved and lived alone in Philadelphia. In that season of feeling

Around that same time, I rekindled my relationship with Darian, and together we began attending different churches, eventually finding a home at Franconia. After having our twin boys, we've felt an overwhelming sense of love, support, and belonging in this church family.

I've experienced Christ most clearly through relationships and in the midst of difficult life moments. Even in times when I struggled, prayer always brought me comfort and hope. I've known for a long time that I wanted to be baptized, but I was waiting for the right place and time. After having our sons, I knew in my heart that I wanted to raise them in a Christ-centered home, just like both Darian and I were raised. God has blessed my life in so many ways, and through baptism, I want to take this step of obedience to grow in my faith and be a strong example to my children as they grow.



Darian Derstine: I was born and raised in Pennsylvania, spending most of my life in Telford. I grew up with my parents, Brian and Denise Derstine, along with my siblings, Jordan and Celena. Today, I live in Schwenksville with my wife, Alycia, and our two sons, Waylon and Maverick. We're currently staying with Alycia's parents as we build our new home in Harleysville.

I attended Franconia Mennonite Church growing up and later went to Christopher Dock High School. After high school, I completed my college education in Hesston, Kansas. I accepted Christ at a young age. My parents have always provided me with a Christ-centered upbringing, and I've grown in my faith through the example they set. I experience Christ's presence most clearly when I'm doing the things I love—hunting, fishing, exploring the outdoors, and flying jets for work. Whenever I face challenges, I turn to prayer. Quang N. Dang: I was born and raised in Da Nang, Viet Nam. My family, like many there, wasn't particularly spiritual. We followed cultural practices like ancestor worship, but they didn't hold much personal meaning. My secular education reinforced my disinterest in spiritual things, and I was ready to abandon all those traditions.

Around 2013, I started to feel truly lost without a purpose. Life felt like such a burden; I wanted "a good life" but had no idea how to get it. Everything I tried seemed like a waste of time. This led to a spiral of anxiety and sadness. I explored philosophy but found no answers there. Then, through a mutual friend, I met an American expat who shared my interest in philosophy. Our conversations deepened over a year or two, and eventually, their faith in Jesus Christ emerged as the core of their life's direction.

For the next few years, I learned about Christianity and attended a local church where my expat friend was a pastor. But I insisted on trying to

Quang N. Dang (cont.) understand faith "my own way," using only logic and reason. I gained head knowledge about the Gospel but no real relationship with Christ, which only made my stress and depression worse. I eventually rejected the Gospel and stopped going to church for a few years.

After a COVID lockdown lifted in 2019, God planted a desire in me to go back to church, just to see friends. I never left. Slowly and miraculously, God softened my heart. I set aside my ego, gave up my own way, and accepted Him as my Savior. I was baptized in October 2020 and became a church member. Since then, God has continually worked in my heart, relieving my anxiety and mending relationships with those around me. He truly is my source of rest. My wife, Julia, and I were married in Vietnam in 2022 and moved to Pennsylvania last year. I am excited to join Julia's home church and keep growing my faith in the community that shaped the Christ-centered life that first drew me to her.



Brian Fallon: During my youth I was raised in a Catholic home and attended Catholic school until 3rd grade when we moved to Chalfont, PA. I was always interested in reading the Bible since we had one on the table, but never actually spent significant time with it. I read a few pages and remembered the teachings but there was no church group to discuss (no Sunday school).

At 16 I remember listening to Christian radio outside of Pep Boys in Montgomeryville. At that time I was being drawn closer to God in a different perspective. The gold statues and church hierarchy became more confusing than helpful. I remember asking the question why we pray to people/Saints other than directly to Jesus. I didn't like the answer and prayed to Jesus anyway.

Jill, my girlfriend at the time and now wife, invited me to Indian Creek Church of the Brethren in 1992. The Anabaptist connection felt closer, more connected with God. I was able to read bible and ask questions in Sunday School. Ultimately, I moved closer to God and was baptized.

Having Jesus in my life brought some career direction. I really enjoy doing His work in retirement communities, connecting with residents and families. Jesus also brought about peace when we lost our son in 2005. I wasn't focused on the current struggle and ultimate loss but knowing my son had a purpose. The connection with Christ has shown me that all of us have a purpose and are on a path. Some are in the weeds, some are in the briars, but we are all on the journey to know Jesus.

Micah Kratz: I grew up in a Christian home with my parents, Randy and Melissa, and my sister Emma. I first attended Indian Creek Church of the Brethren, then Blooming Glen Mennonite Church during my years at Dock Mennonite Academy. I started attending Franconia through college, recently graduating from Liberty University with my degree in nursing. In February 2025, I married my wife, Elle, and we currently live in Souderton. We enjoy being active and spending time outdoors.

I came to know Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior at a young age, shaped by the Christ-centered individuals God has placed in my life. Salvation in Christ is the greatest gift I have ever received, and I am grateful for the opportunity to be baptized here at Franconia as a public declaration of my faith. I look forward to growing, serving, and worshiping alongside this church family. One of my favorite passages in scripture is Matthew 16:24-28, which reminds me of the humility we are called to live in and the power the Lord holds over all things.



Dutch Moyer: I was incredibly blessed to grow up in a home where both of my parents lived out their Christian faith daily. They weren't just churchgoers — they were Christ-followers. Their words, actions, and attitudes reflected the love of Jesus, and from an early age, I saw something in them that I knew I wanted for myself: a real, personal relationship with Jesus Christ.

At the age of 12, I made the decision to accept Jesus as my Lord and Savior. This wasn't just because I was raised in a Christian home or because someone told me to — it was a decision I made with both my heart and mind. By that point, I had enough understanding of Scripture and life

Not because I have it all together, but because of the grace of God working in me. One of my favorite verses is Philippians 4:13: "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." That promise reminds me daily that no matter what I face, Jesus is with me — and He's more than enough.



JoAnn Moyer: I was born and raised in Harleysville, attending Salford Mennonite Church and then Grace Mennonite in Lansdale, where I joined the catechism class as a young teenager. When we were about to join the church, we were to each give a testimony, but I told the Pastor that I didn't have any. How I wish I would have been confronted with the Gospel at that time!

In September, 1961, after a discouraging time in my life, I went with Grace Mennonite to the Billy Graham Crusade in Phila., and after hearing the message I knew that I needed to go forward and give my life to the Lord.

As a teenager, I had an opportunity to attend a tent meeting at Highland Park, but to my sorrow I failed to go forward at the alter call.

with. By then I had married my high school sweetheart and had a daughter, Monique, and later, a son, Matthew.

One night I drove to Grace Mennonite and shared my needs with Pastor Habegger. He said that he didn't know why he happened to be in his office that night, but within 20 minutes, we were on our knees as I asked the Lord for forgiveness for my sin and excepted Jesus Christ as my Savior and Lord. This was on May 8, 1962.

Since then, I didn't always understand things, but the Lord has never left me down. This is why Proverbs 3:5 mean so much to me. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on you own understanding."


